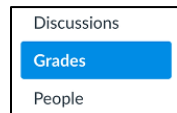




## Viewing & Printing Instructor's Comments in Canvas

### Viewing Instructor Comments (also known as Annotations)

Students may view comments from instructors in their assignment submission in Grades.



Access the course in Canvas, and click on the **GRADES** link located in the course navigation menu.

Click on the title of an assignment.

View Feedback

1. View the annotated comments from your instructor.
2. To reply to a comment, click on the comment and click on the Reply button.
3. When an annotated comment includes multiple content lines, the content box displays an ellipses link.
4. To expand a comment, click the ellipses link. To view stacked replies, click the comment to expand all replies.

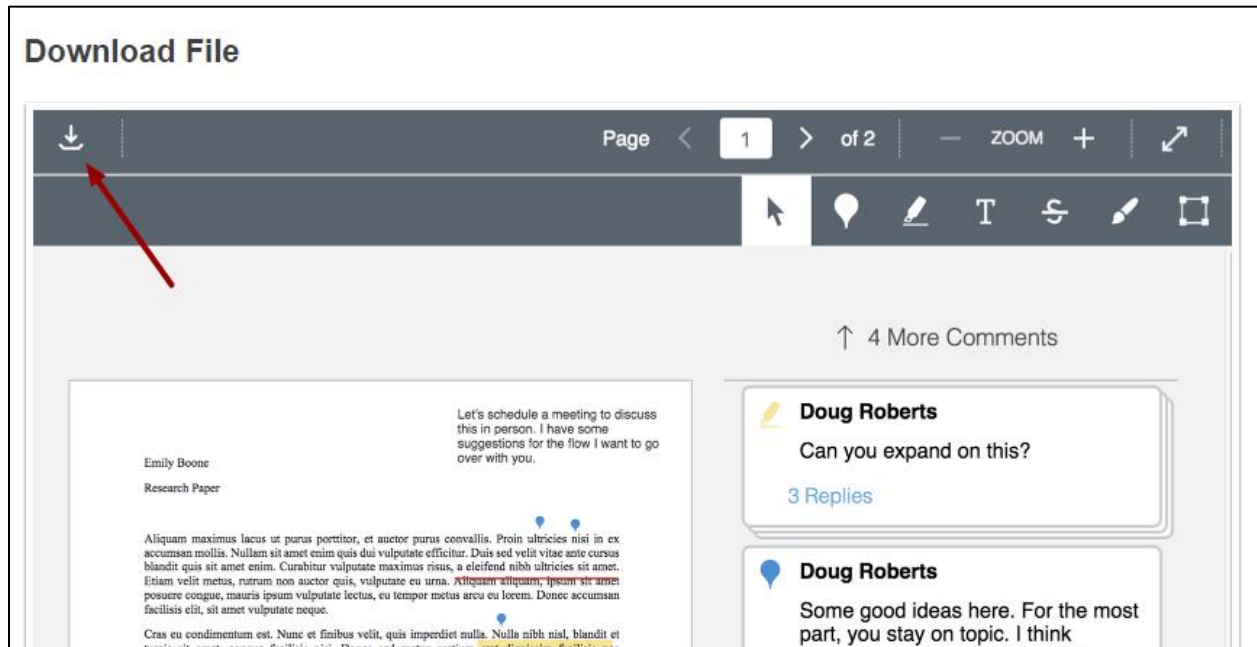
- 1: Click on the comment to expand it.

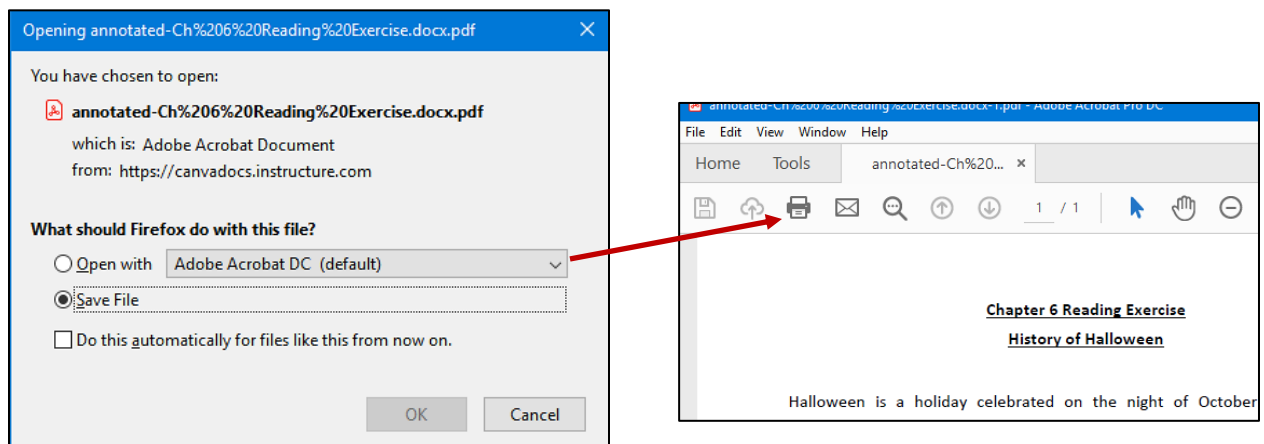
## Printing Comments Using Firefox Browser

To print a PDF of the submission and Instructor comments, click on the **Download** icon.



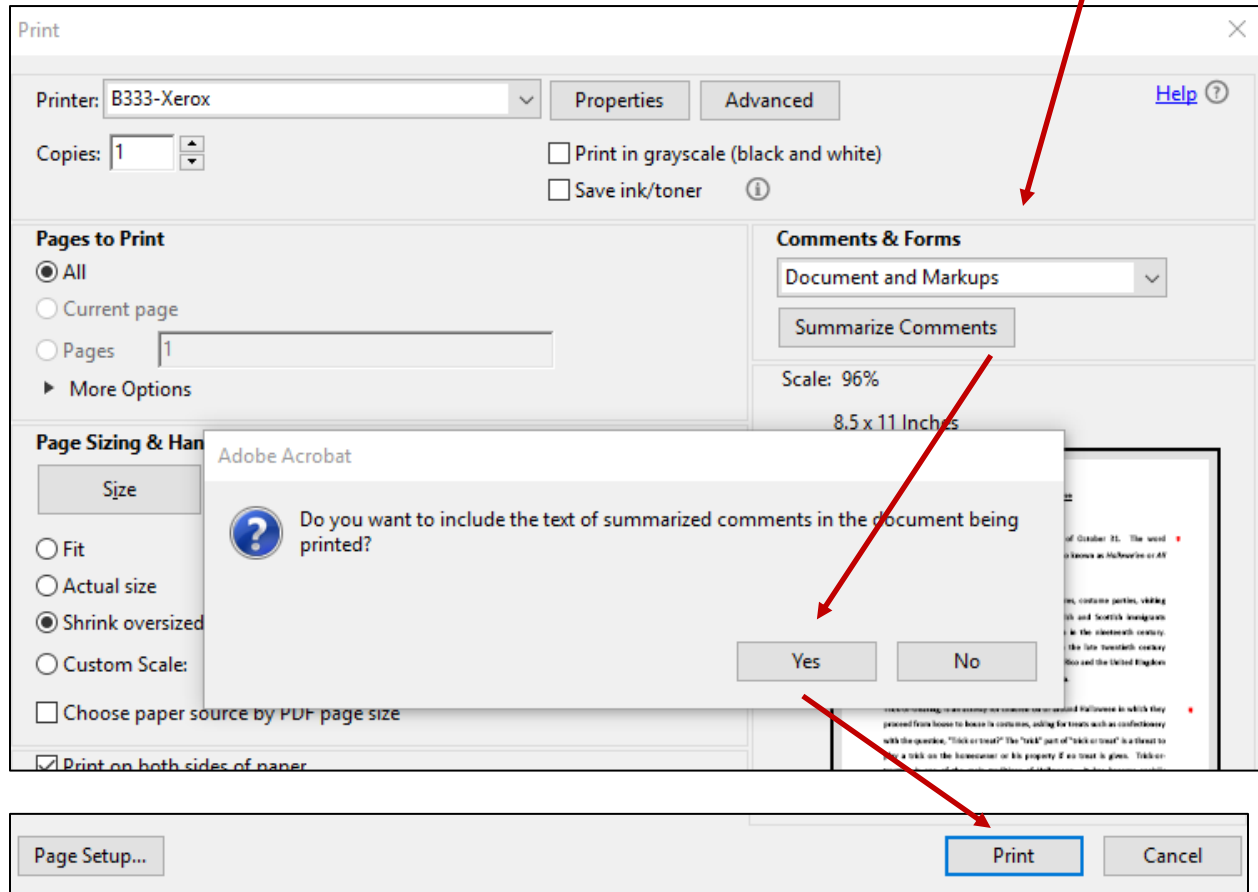
A display box will appear with the option to either open or save your document (in PDF file).

Select “Open with Adobe Acrobat DC (default)” and then click on the **PRINT** icon.



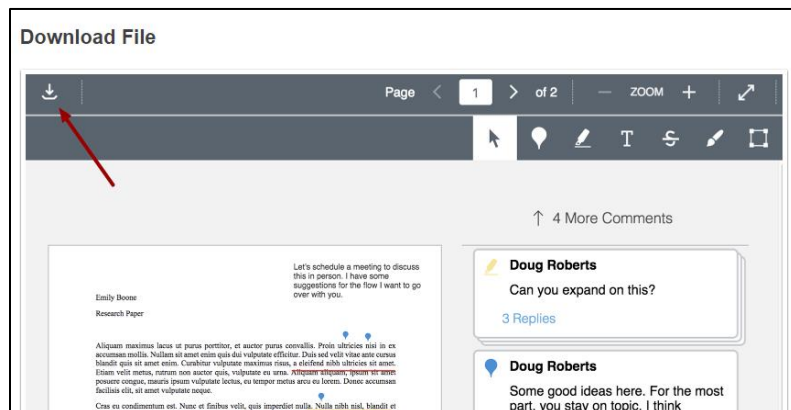
In the print screen, click on the **SUMMARIZE COMMENTS** button. A popup window will appear asking, “Do you want to include the text of summarized comments in the document being printed?” Click on **YES**.

It takes a moment for the comments to be summarized. You can then click on the **PRINT** button.



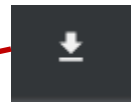
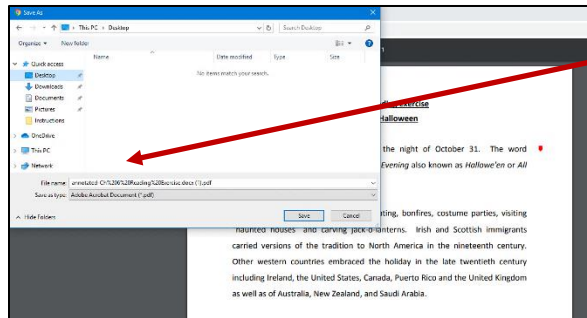
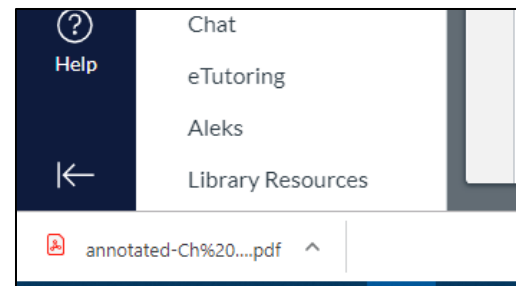
## Printing Comments Using Google Chrome Browser

Click on the **Download** icon.



The PDF file will download to the bottom left of your screen.

Double click on the file name to open the file.



Click on the Download button located on the top right of your screen and save it on your computer, flashdrive, or cloud-based repository.

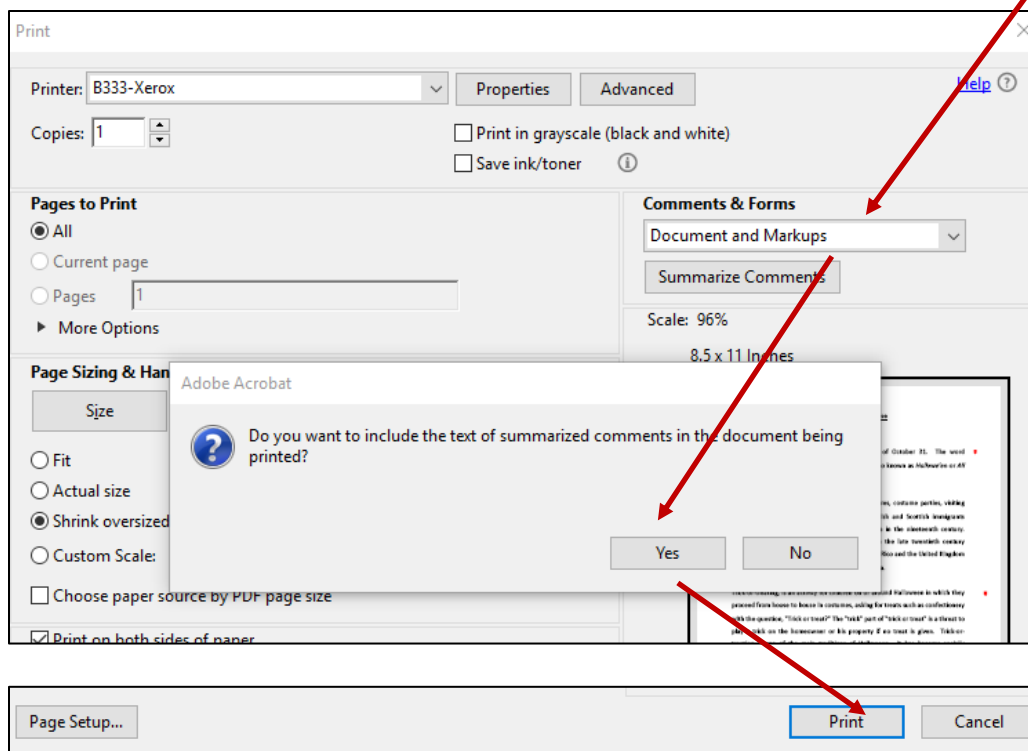
For the purpose of this tutorial, the file is being saved on the desktop.

It will save in a PDF format.

Open the file

In the print screen, click on the SUMMARIZE COMMENTS button. A popup window will appear asking, “Do you want to include the text of summarized comments in the document being printed?” Click on YES.

It takes a moment for the comments to be summarized. You can then click on the PRINT button.



The printed copy will include footnote numbers where comments are located, and on the reverse side of the page will be the actual comments.

**SAMPLE PRINTED PDF:**

It has become socially expected that if one lives in a neighborhood with children one should purchase treats in preparation for trick-or-treaters.
